***ITC History Book* Nearing Completion Unveiling Scheduled for February President's Chapel**

(Atlanta – February 2008) --The Interdenominational Theological Center (ITC) eagerly awaits the completion of the highly anticipated ***ITC History Book***. The ***ITC History Book***, which was co-authored by Drs. Mark Ellingsen, Associate Professor of Church History and Kenneth Henry, Professor, will be unveiled as part of the 50th Anniversary celebration. The book touts information from each of the seven presidencies and gives insight about what contribution each president has made toward the institution and its betterment. The book will be presented during the President's chapel which will take place Thursday, February 21, 2008 at 11:00 a.m. in the ITC Chapel. Following chapel will be a book signing by the co-authors, Drs. Ellingsen and Henry.

Besides being a recapitulation of ITC's last 50 years, The ***ITC History Book*** will provide in-depth background from the Richardson years to the Battle years. Besides the presidents and their individual incumbencies, the ***ITC History Book*** tells the story of a community a community unlike any other – anywhere in the world, a community of six denominationally different seminaries coming together purposely to learn from each other. Beyond the initial six denominations that represent ITC, there are a significant number of students enrolled as "At-Large." The "At-Large" students represent another 15 denominations studying on the campus. The book also provides a look at the impressive and historical leadership that made ITC a member of the Atlanta University Center

The ***ITC History Book*** was proudly designed, printed and bound on site at the ITC Print and Design Center located on the Campus in the James H. Costen Center on the first floor.

Located in the Atlanta University Center, the world's largest center of African American higher education, ITC is the only theological seminary of the United Negro College Fund, and is a member of the Atlanta Regional Consortium for Higher Education (ARCHE). ITC is one of the fully accredited Historically Black Theological Seminaries of the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada (ATS) and the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS).
